-Hebrews 12:1-2





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Fix Your Eyes on Jesus

The New York City Marathon is the largest marathon in the world. The course of the race takes runners through all five boroughs of New York City. In 2016, 51,394 runners finished the race.

In the 1986 marathon, about 20,000 runners entered the race. One of the runners in the race set a record that year. His name was Bob Wieland. Bob didn't finish first in record time. He finished last. He finished 19,413th in the marathon. Bob completed the marathon in 4 days, 2 hours, 47 minutes, and 17 seconds. But Bob's performance was a remarkable achievement. What was it that made Bob Wieland's marathon so special? Bob ran with his arms. 17 years earlier while in Vietnam, Bob lost his legs. When Bob competes in races, he sits on a 15-pound saddle. He covers his fists with pads. He uses his arms to propel himself forward one arm-length at a time. He can run a mile in an hour. That's real perseverance in the face of adversity.

Perseverance is an attitude of not giving up, even though the challenges of life are great! That's the attitude the author of the book of Hebrews wants to instill in his readers. The original recipients of this letter to the Hebrews were being persecuted for their faith. The Hebrew Christians were tempted to give up on Christianity and go back to the old ways of Judaism. God's message to these struggling Christians was clear: "Fix your eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith."

Hebrews 12 is a reminder for all of us—teachers, students, parents and friends of West—that the race that has been marked for us is not a smooth plain; it has obstacles! There will be hills and mountains that test our endurance. In our life, challenges and problems are inevitable. But the big difference is our Spirit-given attitude of faith. Are we going to quit when the going gets tough or are we going to persevere, even when we are pressured by hurdles and challenges in life?

This past school year there were challenges for all of us. There were times when our race was difficult. But during each school day, teachers and students spent time in the word of God. The Holy Spirit used his powerful word to lead each of us to grow in our faith. The Spirit's word strengthened us and empowered us to run our race with perseverance. God's promise given through Isaiah was fulfilled each day: "Those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint." (Isaiah 40:31)

The Christian life is an endurance race. It is a race that often includes trials and hardships—things that hurt, things that can discourage us and cause us despair. The writer to the Hebrews says, "Don't be discouraged. Don't quit! Run with perseverance!" When the feet of our faith feel like lead, when our hearts are heavy and when our souls are ready to give up, let's fix our eyes on Jesus! One day soon, we will cross the finish line and receive from him the victor's crown of life.




A NEW ENGINEERING PROGRAM AT WEST

Although education continues to emphasize and teach the “3 R’s,” **R**eading, **w**riting and **a**rithmetic, there is a fourth “R” that may have been lost along the way—**t**inke**R**ing. Next fall, West Lutheran will work to bring that back as it launches an Engineering track for all students beginning with the course, An Introduction to Engineering Design. In this class, students will learn the fundamentals of mechanical drawing and computer aided design (CAD). In addition, the students can learn about the engineering design process as well as have the ability to design and make their own projects. Currently 15 students have registered for this course with more expected before the 2018/2019 school year begins. The curriculum for this class uses the latest texts and materials from Project Lead the Way, a long-standing national engineering association. Future offerings will include the Principles of Engineering and a project based capstone course.

West Lutheran has had a tradition of alumni going on to complete engineering degrees, often 5 – 10% of a graduating class. This track has largely been served by traditional math and science courses and most recently by engineering based additions to ninth grade science. Those additions have included simple programming, electronics, CAD work and 3D prototyping. The new program will allow students to go much deeper into the design process and engineering fields of study. The program itself will not only be aimed at those that may have engineering in their future, but to any student that wants to know more about how things are made and likes to design, tinker and build.

The STEM program will be taught and directed by Steve Merten. Mr. Merten has completed a STEM education certificate program via the Engineering School at St. Thomas University. He will continue with course training from Project Lead the Way at the University of Minnesota this summer.




WLHS Community Engagement Evening

TRACK



The 2018 track team has had a great deal of success! At the most recent conference meet on May 15th, senior **Jordan Schuler** took first place in shot put and second place in discus. Freshman athletes **Elise Arps** placed first place in the triple jump and **Faith Boerner** took second place in the 3200m. All of these athletes are all-conference. The boys 4x800 team took second place, and are a Honorable Mention in conference.



Other season highlights are senior **Matthew Thomforde's** repeatedly strong 400m, senior **Grant Kokkinen's** consistently strong 800m, freshman **Sam Bjorlin's** long jump and junior **Niles Charlson's** triple jump. Our 4x400 and 4x800 team for boys also was extremely strong at every meet we attended. 
SOFTBALL


That's a "rap!"

A Midsummer Night's Dream

This year's spring drama production William Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream* marked a special occasion: the first Shakespeare production ever performed in West history! Students enjoyed the challenge of tackling ambitious Shakespearean language, and bringing the comedy to life—comedy just as relatable to 21st century audiences as it was in the 1600s. **Lydia Skorseth** (Helena) shared this: "Acting in *A Midsummer Night's Dream* was a unique opportunity to say the least. It was an experience full of emotions such as, 'I'm never going to learn this language,' and 'what on earth is anybody saying!' After going through musicals and children's theaters, it was great to get a fully rounded theater experience, just in my second year of high school."

Students were also treated to a special guest: local theater artist Tyler Michaels, who has performed in countless professional shows around the Twin Cities theater scene. Michaels also holds the Kennedy Center Mark Twain Comedic Performance Award and Ivey Award for Best Actor. Michaels spoke with the West cast and crew about his personal experiences working on the Guthrie production of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, and shared some tricks about his signature physicality acting on the stage. He also gave students hands-on experience from a professional actor's point of view about finding hidden beauty in Shakespeare's language through simple things like rhythm patterns and changing posture. "That workshop was so beneficial!" **Jacob Barnett** (Bottom) stated. **Alyssa Walberg** (Flute) agrees: "It completely changed my perspective about my character."

The acting wasn't the only noteworthy element of this production; the lighting and special effects showcased some of the drama department's latest purchases to enhance our performances. Juniors **Nick Torgerson** and **Ethan Knapp** spent countless hours perfecting the light cues and effects to perfectly capture the ethereal beauty in Shakespeare's fairy world. "[I] saw the play on Sunday and was so impressed with the production," commented Tracy, a community member who attended the performance. "The kids did an amazing job and the teacher did an amazing job opening their eyes and ours to Shakespeare." Thanks to the students and many volunteers who helped make this production a success!
